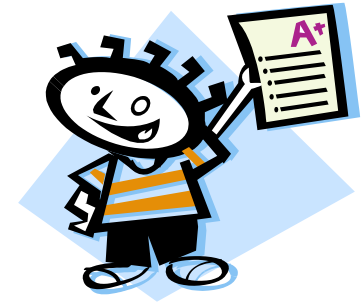
### **Teachers, Tutors & Administrator responsibilities will include:**

- Provide quality instruction in a supportive learning environment
- Use the most recent and successful methods of instruction
- Provide supplemental reading and/or math materials to be used at home
- Have high expectations for all students
- Have grade level standards available to parents
- Involve parents in school decisions regarding their child's learning
- Keep parents informed through Title I parent meetings, workshops, progress reports, newsletters
- Encourage parent volunteers



### **Parent responsibilities include:**

- Please make sure your child gets to school on time.
- Attend Parent-Teacher Conferences
- Read to and with your child regularly
- Participate or volunteer in school activities and/or Title I meetings and workshops.
- Read and respond to notices sent home
- Make school a priority by scheduling appointments and vacations outside of school hours when possible
- Provide time and a place to do homework, and give assistance when needed
- Monitor and limit television, video games, internet and texting
- Promote a positive attitude toward school and learning
